A day in class: for some it starts too early. For most it ends too soon.

This is a true story.

It's 8:03 on a gloomy morning in November, just outside Amsterdam, Netherlands. Eight bus drivers are huddling over coffee in a conference room, while listening to what this day has in store for them.

Less than eight hours from now, they will all be better drivers – 15% better to be exact. (At least if lower fuel consumption is the gauge.) Between now and then, they'll go through their first day of Scania Driver Training (Scheduled Bus version).

In the parking area just outside, two new Scania Omnilink buses are ready to make their contribution. The 10-inch screen on their dashboards reveals the presence of Scania's Fleet Management system.

The benchmark run.

After a quick overview of the Omnilinks, the Scania trainer invites everyone to board the vehicles for a first ride.

The 21km route is very realistic. It includes busy downtown areas, suburbs, stops, roundabouts and a stretch of motorway.

Each of the eight participants gets to drive the designated route. Scania Fleet Management keeps a detailed log of everybody's performance – down to every acceleration, deceleration and gear shift. And of course, every drop of fuel used.

Back in the conference room, the Scania trainer presents the driving results, with emphasis on fuel consumption. Average consumption was 8.4 litres 40.11/100km. And the average duration of the journey was just under 32 minutes.

The analysis.

The trainer proceeds to dissect the ride in detail – discussing how every bus stop, roundabout, stop light, 90-degree turn, etc. – influences consumption. And how they can be negotiated in a more fuel-efficient way. To dramatize his points, he uses a combination of photos, video footage, cut-away graphics and computer animations.

The big surprise.

Then comes drive No. 2. Same itinerary, same conditions, same buses, same drivers.

But a very different result.

This time, the drivers approach the task in a more planned, premeditated way – especially at stops and in roundabouts. Their speed is steadier throughout the run, and 10km/h lower on the motorway.

And bingo! The average consumption score for the 21km route is now 7.1 litres: a reduction of 15% across the eight drivers. The average driving time was just under 34 minutes, an increase of only two minutes.

The savings in this case would amount to 6,100 litres of fuel per 100,000km. Not bad for a single day of training. Even seasoned drivers (and fleet owners) find results like these compelling, to put it mildly.

A European driving school with a European fan club.

For years already, Scania has offered customers driver training in various forms – ranging from an hour of instruction at vehicle hand-over to fullblown courses.

The EU training directive has prompted us to create a single, comprehensive programme and to offer it to customers all over Europe. This focus on one, common programme benefits customers everywhere in terms of quality and value for money.

Across Europe, Scania owners (and their drivers) are discovering what they stand to gain. As their attention turns increasingly to fuel savings, road safety and environmental care, their appreciation for Scania Driver Training is consistent and genuine.

In Poland, experience has confirmed that training reduces fuel consumption. With driving distances of 200,000 kilometres, a realistic 10% reduction leads to annual savings on the level of \notin 5,000 per vehicle.

A food transporter found that the training of their drivers had a payback time of less than a month.

In Germany, a series of courses – with drivers from different businesses participating – all led to double-digit initial fuel savings: one fleet owner in Niedersachsen with a long-haulage fleet slashed fuel consumption by between 15 and 22% during the course. Another achieved savings of between 17 and a whopping 25%.

Two garbage collectors in Saarland saw similar results – ranging from 13 to 19% initial fuel reduction. (Even over time, these drivers are maintaining a consumption that's nearly 10% lower than before they were trained.)

In France, statistics from around 200 Scania driver courses conducted each year since 2004 show an average reduction in fuel consumption of 10%. Drivers of trucks with high-torque engines and long-ratio axles have been especially successful.

In Holland, Scania drivers across all vehicle types have seen their fuel consumption drop by 11% on average after one day of training. Six months later, it was still down by 6%. (Which, incidentally, goes to show the value of recurring training.)

The list goes on. From Norway, Sweden, the UK and other European countries, we get similar positive accounts from Scania training organisations. They tell us of drivers who can hardly believe their eyes. And of owners who can't wait to train more drivers.

It's a growing fan club. Maybe you should join it, too?

Scania Fleet Management, which can be used in mixed fleets, includes an on-board logging and communication unit, a communication subscription, a GPS and a web-based back-office interface.

The system collects the vehicle's data continuously, analyzes it against your own parameters and reports back through the web portal – highlighting potential action areas.
